After a year absence due to the pandemic, The Minster School held its annual prizegiving evening on Thursday 16th September 2021. Students, parents, families, and governors joined in celebrating fantastic achievements in what has been the most difficult of times.



The annual prizes awarded by The Minster School represent its long and illustrious heritage with many bequests dating back to the early part of the 20th century. Some of the most historic prizes are awarded by the Old Southwellians, an organisation representing ex-pupils of the school. These include prizes for the Head Boy and Head Girl and those demonstrating musical and sporting prowess.

During the evening Ben Chaloner, Head Teacher, addressed the assembled students and guests. He reflected upon what has been such a turbulent year for students, and society, up and down the country and across the world. "We are so proud to celebrate some of our student's great achievements. This evening we are able to recognise some of our school's students from across the year groups – from juniors through to departing year 13s. Prizes were awarded to students who had achieved excellent results in public examinations, sporting and music success, and also those that have demonstrated our key virtues – Wisdom, Optimism, Resilience, Kindness and Service. I am so proud of each and every prizewinner – but am aware that this is just the tip of the iceberg and that there are many other students who should be proud of how they have handled themselves over the past 18 months and whom we've not been able to recognise this evening."

The guest speaker at the event was international speaker, mental resilience expert and published author John Dabrowski. John has travelled the world and his clients include Rolls Royce, Deloitte, Aviva, Hilton, Cunard and NatWest bank. He was able to deliver his life story and three key lessons that he has learned in his life.

Congratulations to all prize winners and their families and particular good wishes for the future to those students leaving The Minster School at the end of year 13 to as they embark upon further study at university, conservatoires, or college, begin apprenticeships or start employment in the workplace.



UGIVE UGANDA CRAFT FAIR




ADVENT WORSHIP & COMMUNION

YEAR 12 DRAMA WORKSHOP

01/10/2021

On Friday 1st October our year 12 drama class took a trip to the Nottingham Boys High School to partake in a drama workshop. The company that ran it was called Gecko, a theatre that focus on physical theatre and they don't primarily use words to impart narrative or understanding. This is a style that is both athletic and emotionally honest. Kenny, (the man leading our workshop) taught us the importance of breath, as it was the anchor for exploring all movements and emotions. We were instructed to not verbalise out loud, only through our breath and body language, as the choral breath incites a societal sensation and allows the ensemble to connect on a deeper level. Kenny gave us both partner exercises and group exercises that were designed to push us out of our comfort zones and allow us to further comprehend the methods that they use at Gecko. We had to utilise our improvisational skills as performers, when creating short scenes, as he said the best moments are often created by a spark or spontaneity. We are going to be able to see these skills put into action when we take our group trip to see 'The Wedding' (a production by Gecko.)

VISIT TO THE NATIONAL HOLOCAUST CENTRE AND MUSEUM

18/01/2022

On 18th January 2022, the History Department will be taking year 11 History students to the National Holocaust Centre and Museum in order to support them in their GCSE studies. As part of this visit, students will be able to understand the stages of persecution in Nazi Germany when exploring the museum and consider challenging moral and ethical issues facing German society at the time through an educational workshop. Alongside this, students will have the unique opportunity to listen to the testimony of a Holocaust survivor and ask them questions.
