#### WHAT'S ON IN HISTORY?

It's been a really exciting and busy half term for our History students here at the Minster.

Year 7 have begun to look at the post Tudor period of History with our enquiry question of "Mad, Bad and Dangerous?" They've covered events such as the Gunpowder Plot, the English Civil War and will be continuing to learn about the Witch Trials, Pirates and the Great Plague. They've really thrown themselves into their work with fantastic contributions in lessons and some fantastic work with Primary sources.

Year 8 have been learning about the Suffragette's and using Historian's interpretations to assess their impact and analyse both the positive and negative responses there were to their tactics. The level of discussion has been impressive across the board and Lyla in year 8 has used her understanding of the fight for Women's suffrage to ask in depth questions about the world we currently live in and predictions for the future.

In year 9 students have completed their study of the Civil Rights movement and produced some fantastic assessment responses to a variety of questions. They were able to use a variety of case studies to assess the impact of the Civil Rights movement. Lily in year 9 made some fantastic comments when judging whether or not the Civil Rights movement changed the situation for Black Americans or just challenged it.

Year 10 have impressed us with their hard work and focus during their mock exam period and we were really pleased to see this dedication pay off for students. There are many students we could congratulate and we'd love to name you all but we'd love to give a particular mention to Lucas who exceeded his target grade and always puts in 100% effort in all lessons.

Year 11 have come through a lot over the last two years and we couldn't be prouder. We can't wait to celebrate your results with you in the summer and we know that the hard work and resilience you've shown will be rewarded. Well done for completing your three History GCSE exams and we look forward to seeing many of you return in year 12.

Year 12 have been very impressive over these last few weeks, juggling their mock exams with their research for their NEA. The NEA is their Non-Examined Assessment (Coursework). Students have been busy reading a variety of academic texts as part of the research phase of their projects. ### BANK OF ENGLAND SPEAKER 18/07/2022

Y12 and Y10 Economists attended a talk given by Tarkus Frost, a Senior Manager of Traded Risk at the Bank of England on Monday 18th July. Tarkus gave the students a brief resume of his career. He went to school in Mansfield, completed an Economics degree at the University of Loughborough and has worked at the bank of England in numerous roles for seventeen years. He talked about the main activities of the Bank of England as the UK's Central Bank, which includes running the UK's payments infrastructure, which accounts for £750bn of transactions every day. He also discussed the role the Bank of England plays in deciding the base rate of interest and the other tools it employs to achieve price stability, a particularly challenging task at the moment!


Students listened attentively, despite the heat, and asked some probing questions. The reward for the best question was a gold bullion bar - unfortunately the chocolate variety.




# SHAKESPEARE IN SHORT - A TRILOGY OF TRAGEDIES 05/07/2022




In Year 13, the Minster School entered students in the main Olympiad for the first ever time. This consisted of a 2hr 45min paper of eye wateringly challenging Physics questions. Both students emerged from the experience somewhat battered and bruised, but very glad to have taken part. Ben S and Charles O (shown in the image with their certificates, and leavers day fancy dress!) should rightfully proud of their achievements, with Ben gaining a Bronze 1st Class Award and Charles gaining a highly sought-after Gold Award.

Lincoln University Physics Challenge: Charles O also entered a competition set by Lincoln University where he was required to produce solutions to a diverse set of difficult Physics questions. He not only won the competition, but received the following comment from the organisers..."We are delighted to inform you that you have been awarded 1st prize. Your submission was outstanding to the extent that you got a perfect mark. Congratulations!!"

The Great Egg Race Engineering challenge: During Manufacturing and Engineering week, a team of Year 12 Physicists and Mathematicians took part in the Great Egg Race at the NEC in Birmingham. The students were challenged to construct a device to project an egg into a target without damage. The organiser of the event was so impressed with the team that he wrote to the school....

"Although they didn't win on the day, I felt I had to write to you to say how impressed I was with the entire team. Your pupils competed against a team from Cranfield University and a team of engineering apprentices: not the easiest thing to do at their stage of education. Not only did they hold their own, and get close to winning, they devised the most innovative solution to protect the egg across the two days of competition. This won admiration from everyone watching, and earned worried looks from the other teams too!"
